

Political Polarization in the American Public



This study provides a longitudinal perspective on the <u>political attitudes</u> of our country. Based on a nationwide sample of 10,013 respondents, the research reveals how increasing ideological uniformity and partisan antipathy are affecting politics, policy and everyday life. A <u>dynamic data interactive</u> illustrates how polarization has increased in recent years.

Since the last longitudinal snapshot was

Drawing on the same longitudinal survey data described above, the researchers at Pew note that the public's political attitudes and values come in <u>many shades and hues</u>. Diverse views are unified by frustration with politics, but little else. As a result, both parties face formidable challenges in reaching beyond their bases and building sustainable coalitions.

Pew's typology sorts voters into cohesive groups based on their values and provides in-depth data about each group's views of society and expectations of government. Arts advocates can mine this data to customize their messages to members of each cohort.
