Wednesday, October 2, 2019 Asset Based Approaches to Grant Making Breakout Workshops Presenter Notes

Chuck Winkler, Program Administrator, Texas Commission on the Arts

- This breakout session featured Texas Commission on the Arts' rural initiatives as a starting point for conversation.
- 8 tours made of 4 in the spring and 4 in the summer, each tour including 6 contiguous rural counties.
- Each artist must complete 6 performances, free to the public at least 2 different counties in the group. They can chose which counties they visit, but we do ask that they try to reach them all.
- This program is a way to reach rural counties and to get libraries, schools, and other non-profit organizations and venues to open TCA accounts. Once they have accounts, they can apply for our Arts Respond Performance Support grant program. https://www2.arts.state.tx.us/tcagrant/TXArtsPlan/CC6.htm
- Session attendees then asked questions and gave suggestions.
- My biggest take-away was the idea that we could better foster relationships and
 make more impact in these counties if we went back to the same counties year after
 year for a while. I like this idea, and I am trying to get it accepted here at the
 agency.

- Does the program embrace the foundation of asset-based approach or is the main goal to get money in an area, fill a need, deficit, etc.?
- Asset based grant making:
 - o Focus on community assets and strengths rather than problems and needs
 - o Identifies and mobilizes individual and community assets, skills, and passions
 - o Community driven building communities from the inside out
 - Relationship driven

- Art of Community: Rural SC
 - Started as a pilot in 6 contiguous counties (federally designated Promise Zone) in 2016
 - Focus on the intersection of arts and culture with education, health, and economic development
 - Sits within the Community Arts department, though is a cross-agency effort (especially Arts Education and Folk and Traditional Arts)
 - Implements a Maven structure one maven for each county puts together a team (cross generational, transracial, multi-priority)
 - Intentionally NOT through local arts agencies
 - o Build relationships within communities that are often isolated
 - o Didn't lead with the money OR the arts
 - Mavens and teams identified an area of focus and then we shifted to where the arts and culture show up (assets)
 - Shift mindset from scarcity to assets

Example

- Denmark SC Yvette McDaniel, Maven
- Identified a street corner with an abandoned dilapidated building to turn into an art park
- o Started with a \$1,000 grant used it to clear the land
- Town Council found out and worked with the power company to run power to the lot
- Trash hauler came and removed all trash for free
- o First event: Winter Wonderland (Yvette's story about sleeping in her car)
- Word got out and by spring, the black and white churches both had representatives on the maven's committee
- Spring jubilee: food, art, performances, town officials came, intergenerational and transracial
- Now they have a \$10,000 grant to take the next step will level property, have public art, landscaping, performance space
- How this shows up in grantmaking
 - Dealing with infrastructure in rural communities
 - o Barriers in our own processes and requirements; institutional myths

Big takeaways

- Broaden our own view of what is "art" AND stop seeing ourselves as the people who get to define that.
- Changed our agency mindset from "we have what you need" to "how do we support what you have?"
- Connected us in pockets of the state that we have "offered" or "tried" for years to connect. This was the first year in our agencies history that we had a grant in every single county in the state.
